As Chair of Clarkston Area Youth Assistance (CAYA), it is both an honor and a privilege to reach out to you today. CAYA thrives because of the dedication and generosity of our sponsors, donors, staff, and volunteers who believe in building a stronger, more connected community.

Over the past year, CAYA has continued to make meaningful strides toward our mission of strengthening youth and families by preventing and reducing juvenile delinquency, neglect, and abuse through community involvement. As of June 2025, we were able to help 34 students attend day camp and overnight camp during the summer with donor and partnership support. Our skill building grants allowed 37 students to participate in a variety of sports, dance, robotics, and driver's training that would otherwise not have been possible for these families.

We have launched new initiatives such as our Podcasts that address vital topics that are Independence Township relevant for today's families and a new Music Mashup after-school program for elementary school students. We have expanded our outreach by utilizing more social media resources. All these things are made possible thanks to our staff, volunteers, sponsors, donors, supporters and we are so grateful for all these contributors.

CAYA welcomed 5 new board members this past school year. Their contributions have been impactful and will help us in the next year and beyond with much needed coverage committees such as Fundraising and Public Relations.

Introducing Our Newest Program: Music Mashup

Music Mashup is an after-school program developed by volunteers at CAYA in partnership with Pine Knob Elementary School. The goal of this initiative is to engage children through rhythm, instruments, improvisation, listening, and teamwork. In its first year, 12 students enthusiastically explored a variety of percussion instruments, including djembes, tambourines, dunduns, triangles, buffalo drums, and shakers. Feedback from teachers, parents, and volunteers has been overwhelmingly positive, highlighting the value and impact of the program.

Pilot Session Highlights

During our pilot session, we observed increasing enthusiasm and confidence among participants, especially those students who were new to music or typically more reserved. Building on this success, next year (2025/26) we will be accepting students in 2nd through 5th grade who have been identified by their teachers as most likely to benefit from this program.

Program Expansion

The program is expanding in the 2025-2026 year to include North Sashabaw Elementary School and will begin in October.























Family Education Jamie Graves, Chair

The Family Education Committee is responsible for identifying and implementing educational programs that promote family growth and youth development. Program topics are selected annually based on current community needs and trends.

Parenting Under Stress Podcast Series

The Family Education Committee launched a six-episode **Parenting Under Stress** podcast series during the 2024–2025 school year. The series was developed in partnership with therapists from Ellie Mental Health in Clarkston and was designed to provide parents with practical strategies, stress-management tools, and support in navigating the challenges of raising children.

Key focus areas included:

- Practical stress-relief techniques and the importance of support systems.
- Balancing parental responsibilities with self-care and modeling healthy stress management.
- Effective time management strategies for families, including visual tools and routines.
- Shifting from behavior-based rewards to connectionbased experiences to foster resilience.
- Strengthening blended family dynamics, communication skills, and shared values.
- Recognizing when professional assistance may be needed and encouraging healthy help-seeking behavior.



Supplemental resources were made available on the podcast website to accompany each episode. The series episodes have been downloaded **191** times.



Smarter Choices

The Smarter Choices program was designed for 6th–7th grade students and provided age-appropriate education on the risks associated with substance use. The program was delivered across four sessions by Joan Baert from Easterseals MORC and 14 students participated.

Looking Ahead

The Family Education Committee remains committed to providing high-quality educational programming that addresses the evolving needs of families within the community. Planning for the upcoming year will continue to emphasize relevant, accessible, and impactful programming.

Youth Recognition Judy Parnes, Chair

The 2025 Youth Recognition Ceremony, for the first time at Clarkston High School (CHS): On the evening of April 24th, 72 students from Young Fives to Grade 12, were recognized and celebrated for growth in personal well-being and/or for demonstrating their concern for the well-being of others. Over 350 proud, appreciative family and community members attended, including 40 nominators. As guests took their seats, they were entertained by the CHS Clarinet Choir and CHS Marimba Quartet.

Speaking at the Ceremony were the MC, Cari Neubeck, Independence Township Clerk; the Keynote Speaker, Staci Puzio, Director of Student Growth, Well-being, and Community Partnerships; making Sponsor Remarks Sean R. Miller, Springfield Township Clerk. Staci Puzio noted that the honorees' presence in this world matters deeply. "...and your voice—each one of you—adds to a powerful chorus of hope." Sean Miller sincerely thanked CAYA sponsors, who understand that investing in our youth is investing in a better future for all of us. To the honorees, "You've already made an impact, and you not only inspire your peers, but every adult in the room."



Each honoree's affirmation, based on nominator words, was read aloud for all to hear, as the honorees walked across the stage, receiving heartfelt congratulations from 18 dignitaries representing Clarkston Community Schools (CCS), Independence Township, Springfield Township, City of the Village of Clarkston, CCS Board of Education, Oakland County Prosecutor's Office, and Oakland County Youth Assistance. Directly following the Ceremony, everyone was treated to a festive dessert reception.

Finally, there is the rest of the Youth Recognition story, often unseen. BEFORE the Ceremony, every attempt is made to follow-up on RSVPs, so honorees can feel seen, acknowledged, valued, and loved. DURING the Ceremony, a CCS photographer captured some of the special moments of the connections made between the dignitaries and the honorees—quiet moments filled with pride, empathy, warmth, and love. AFTER the Ceremony, honorees leave with a folder of personalized certificates provided by area dignitaries, a printed copy of their own affirmation suitable for framing, and lifelong positive memories to call upon for years to come. It is always an evening of well-being for all who attend!

Gardens also help to support CAYA primary prevention programs.









CCS School Bookmark Projects:



Caseworker Report Lauren Klos, LMSW


According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "legacy" is defined as, "The long-lasting impact of particular events, actions, etc. that took place in the past, or of a person's life." When I think of the word "legacy" for CAYA, I think of the countless lives that our services have positively impacted since 1961. Of the 64 years since CAYA's existence, my small slice of impact in Casework Services has been over the past decade.

I've been in the CAYA office for 10 years and this year, I've been pleasantly surprised to see some positive outcomes of past caseload youth. It has been such a joy to hear their success stories or to have them stop by and share how they are doing. Some of these young adults are now firefighters and EMS workers, paraprofessionals for children with special needs, law enforcement officers, construction workers, college students and graduates, and thriving as hard-working citizens in our community and beyond. When I worked with these students, they had their struggles, with good days and difficult ones (like all of us). It's wonderful to see how they've pushed through, finding strength in the struggle, and now they are flourishing as young adults. I am truly delighted and thrilled to hear of their success stories, as well as honored and blessed to have been perhaps a small part of their journey in becoming thriving young adults.

<u>Top 10 Trends: July 2024 - June 2025</u>

- 1. Substance use: marijuana and vaping (CJHS had most referrals for substance use)
- 2. Parent support connection to resources, parenting strategies/ideas/resources (Parent Project class referrals), emergency needs
- 3. Completing accountability assignments—community service (297.75 hours completed), vision boards, videos, research projects, court hearings, essays, apology letters, Ripple Effects lessons
- 4. Mental health needs
- 5. Grief and loss

- 6. Peer conflicts, bullying, harassment, fighting, violent behavior
- 7. Family relationships, healthy relationships and friendships
- 8. Decisions and goal-setting
- 9. School attendance and engagement
- 10. Advocacy support


130 total families impacted by casework services

63% of new referrals engaged in services


